


a look at the mission **in pictures**



Assisting with the unprecedented return of the Dinka Bor to their homeland, UN agencies – supported by the UN Mission in Sudan (UNMIS) – and NGOs have opened a large camp near Juba, the capital of Southern Sudan. The Lologo camp is a way-station for more than 4,000 women, children and elderly among the Dinka Bor; with the Dinka herdsmen continuing on foot to Bor, with thousands of cattle. UNHCR is managing the camp; the World Food Programme is giving food; UNICEF is providing drug kits and non-food items. The Food and Agriculture Organization is vaccinating cattle as they pass through Juba, and fighting the spread of a tick-carried disease through the herds. UNMIS doctors from the Bangladeshi contingent in Juba are giving medical care to the camp population. Also, the UNMIS Bangladeshi engineering contingent is working to improve the overall living conditions, digging wells to provide drinking water and digging latrines. This vulnerable population will be transported from Juba to Bor on river barges, organized by the IOM.
